Reports to Board and related business:

1. **City NPC – Rob Dickinson:** – see attached report

2. **President's report – Lori L:**

a) Community Garden: Update from Committee Chair Shellbie C: We've made great strides in the past year towards getting the Garden built in 2022, and we are grateful for help from Traugott via Joe K for wood donation to build garden boxes. We are looking for more members. Mixing Jar fundraiser made about \$460 last year and ctte made around \$1,700 all totalled from multiple small fundraisers, which we are planning to deposit into EWCA general fund for safekeeping soon. Ctte is getting ready to submit application for a \$5,000 Choosewell grant; have letter of support for it from Calgary Horticultural Society; am working with Larry Leach of 12CSI for support letter, need an EWCA board vote for our letter of support. Shellbie motioned for "EWCA to provide letter in support for Community Garden Ctte to build the Garden at the Hall; Ali seconds. All approved, motion passed. Lori to work with Shellbie to provide letter.

b) Kassi is looking for message ideas for the 3-way sign - just shoot her an email or text as usual but until then she'll just change the mtg dates and mention Garden Ctte is looking for more members

c) Next steps on call to action to Cllr Carra re: traffic issues on Erin Woods Blvd etc.-See safety director's report

3. Safety Director – Joe K: Report attached / plans for hosting Cllr Carra's Q & A with EWCA and community at large. Will be working with Cllr Carra's office to set up live event soon

4. 1st VP / Bingo Director – Shannon C: Vote to hire Stacy Benoit as backup bartender-Carolyn requested All Nations Church to go back up to full market rent for March 1/22. Carolyn also asked if a renter could hold a fundraiser legally – Board agrees no reason not to allow it. We have a couple of rentals coming up, business is picking up. Bingo is going well and in the 3rd quarter (brought in ~\$9K since October 2021); we should be hearing soon from AGLC to schedule a Casino in Q3-2022, but no word on any funding distribution changes for the Casino proceeds. Stacy has agreed to be our backup bartender and did her first night with us this past Saturday. She also sits on the garden committee. Shannon motions for EWCA to hire Stacy Benoit as backup bartender, Kassi seconds, all in favour, motion passed.

5. Treasurer – John S: Financial report – financial statements attached / budget update-Running at a deficit still and hoping to start the jellybean Dances in the next few months; rentals have still been good, the Casino will help with funding due by end of 2022; funding from Bingos has increased now that they are live events (not online) again.

6. Rink Co-ordinator – Jonathan M: (absent) Outdoor Rink update - The rink has been holding up well with the nice weather which has been awesome. Still in talks about a more permanent structure though

7. Events Director – Ali M: Potential events – Nothing planned for Valentine's Day or Family Day and no other event planning currently in the works due to this Omicron wave and outdoor restrictions capped at 20 people. Ali is happy to help with jellybean dances if need be, although Christina (office mgr) may be interested in taking over Ashlynn's role on this. St Patties Day possibly a Skate Party depending on Covid restrictions and weather.

8. Fundraising & Grants Director – Kayla S: (absent) needs others' project ideas needing funding; is ready and willing to work with other board and garden committee members on grant applications as identified as appropriate / feasible, just reach out to her for help.

9. 2nd VP / ECTAS Director: - Anne M: ECTAS report-ETAS is still operating and doing ok, March 3 is the next mtg

2022 Capital Conservation Grant Guidelines – new updates

Circulated to EWCA on January 13, 2022

The City provides resources to community partners through the Capital Conservation Grant (CCG) to address capital lifecycle needs. On an annual basis (January), the Capital Conservation Grant Guidelines are updated.

Capital Conservation Grant is now the larger name of the granting program which encompasses the Capital Lifecycle Grant and the Engineering Consulting Grant Program (ECP).

Please make sure to discuss any projects within your Lease/LOC as far in advance as possible with your NPC.

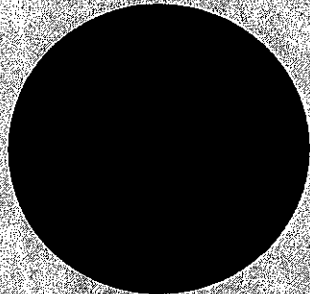

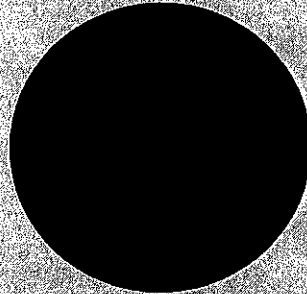
2020 Community Association Service Measure

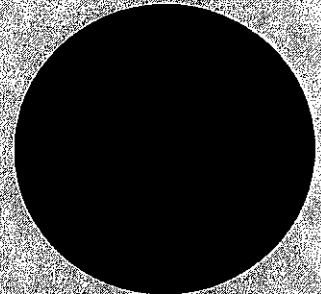
Information gathered from the Service Measures has been shared back with CAs for their own documentation and tracking use in their annual report back to the community, and their use in grant applications.



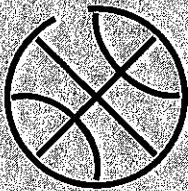

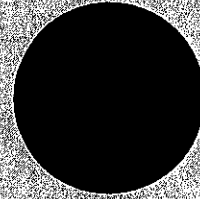

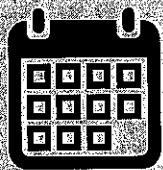

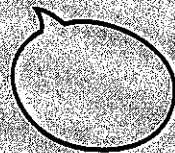

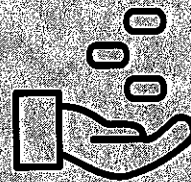

Garden report for March 2022

The Garden Committee is currently working on getting a few projects started, the first one as we are planning is another rain barrel sale with a different company located in Granum Alberta. The barrels retail for \$65 and the committee can decide what price to sell them at, opposed to our last attempt at a rain barrel sale where we were not in control of the prices of the barrels. And they had a minimum rain barrel requirement of 100 barrels. The company in Granum does not have a minimum requirement so that is not a concern this time around. We are currently deciding when to hold this fundraiser as we want the pick up dates to be sometime in June going along with a plant sale. We are also hoping to buy a couple rain barrels for the garden if the budget can permit it as well as the community association. The committee is currently working with the community Association to finalize the dates and if there would be a possibility of also including the food trucks to boost attendance. Members of the garden committee have started some seedlings to sell at this plant sale and the plants should be ready by mid June. Finally along with the seedlings and the rain barrels we are also considering a kernels fundraiser to have at the event in June, We are still considering this and weighing the pros and cons as the Kernels fundraiser does not have the same profit margin as the rain barrels and seedlings do.

A member of the twin views community garden over in Dover recently reached out and offered to lend some help for when the construction of the garden begins, the twin views garden is a garden that aims at growing fresh produce to donate and last year they were able to grow 400lbs of produce to donate to local charities. They can offer resources and could be able to send some volunteers for construction as well, helping us get the garden up and running this spring/summer.

As the spring is fast approaching we are working hard on finalizing blueprint designs for the garden as well as an operations manual and a budget to present to the community association and hopefully get a vote. With the wood supplied by Joe King there is a very good chance we can build in the summer, as long as we can get soil, tools and any other necessary equipment to run the garden.

The end of February the community garden applied for the choosewell funding grant and we will hear back on the status of the application mid April if the community garden is to get any funds. If the community garden is able to obtain these grants, any funds would go directly to the community association and we would be able to supply an updated budget with the allocated funds. With the funds we would be able to purchase better soil, fertilizer, more tools, and possibly even create some free seed kits for the opening of the garden.

The committee is almost done with the blueprints, budget, and operations manual to present to the community association so please keep an eye out as we will be sending them on the way soon, then we can all decide on if anything needs to be changed by the next community association meeting.

- SLOWS Machine should be installed along the school zones on Erin Woods Drive by April once the weather heats up a little.
- Working on the Change.org website. I need to spend some more time on the verbiage. So far, I have:
 - “In 2015, 16-year-old Nick Paswisty was struck and killed trying to cross the Erin Woods Boulevard (<https://calgary.ctvnews.ca/sunlight-in-driver-s-eyes-considered-a-factor-in-fatal-erin-woods-collision-1.2569796>). There was outcry from the community for the city to do something about drivers speeding through our neighbourhood. On January 19th 2022 an 11-year-old girl was also struck on a "notoriously dangerous" crosswalk by a driver who fled the boulevard after the incident (<https://calgary.ctvnews.ca/calgary-police-look-for-driver-in-hit-and-run-that-injured-11-year-old-girl-1.5746396>). There are a litany of driving offenses mentioned on our various social media accounts, and far more which go un mentioned.”
 - I’ll wrap this up by the end of the week. I plan to make reference to many more specific incidents.
- The City has again acknowledged our needs for traffic calming. An email from our Ward 9 liaison Jessica Thorburn mentioned the following actions.
 - Pausing the meeting with Gian Carlo while 2 scheduled meetings take place with the roads department sometime through the next few months.
 - There is a lighting review underway with roads for both intersections.
 - The city plans to re-paint the crosswalks with “ladder style” painting to increase visibility.
 - CPS focus on speeders in Erin Woods this month (as shown in the attachment below) this has already been noticed and reported on social media by a member of the community.
 - A request has been put into the roads department requesting any additional plans they may have for the Erin Woods community.
- I’ve solicited the neighbourhood via social media for other ideas to implement with regards to road safety.
- I’ve also created a EWCA_Safety@outlook.com email address. Which I will be using for any initiatives involving safety in Erin Woods.

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March 2022 photo enforcement locations

In response to community needs identified through statistical analysis, collisions, and citizen concerns, mobile photo radar will be set up on Crowchild Trail, Glenmore Trail, Deerfoot Trail, Macleod Trail, Sarcee Trail and Stoney Trail.

For the month of March photo radar will be focusing on the communities of Bridgeland/Riverside, Castleridge, Country Hills, Coventry Hills, Cranston, Dalhousie, Edgemont, Erin Woods, Falconridge, Harvest Hills, Hawkwood, Haysboro, Hidden Valley, Huntington Hills, Legacy, McKeznie Towne, Meadowlark Park, Mount Pleasant, Panorama, Silver Springs, Sundance, Temple, Thorncliffe, Walden, West Hillhurst, and Windsor Park.

As well as photo radar, there are 58 Intersection Safety Camera (ISC) locations throughout the city. These cameras can photograph vehicles entering the intersections during all phases of the signal, including red light infractions.

These cameras continue to reduce collisions and foster a safer driving environment at our intersections.

The speed on green initiative uses up to 55 of these ISC locations to capture vehicles that speed through green and yellow lights. Speeding fines reflect how fast you are travelling over the limit. Speeds in excess of 50 km/hr over the speed limit result in an appearance before a judge.

These drivers not only put themselves in danger, but they also endanger the lives of others.
